1961: Ronald Reagan is brought to Jonesboro with the GE Theater as the guest speaker for the annual campaign kickoff.

1970s

1983: The Loaned
Executive Program
begins, encouraging
corporations to "loan"
employees to the United
Way. Loaned Executives
report to the United
Way office one day
each week for 10 weeks.

1983: United Way agrees
to underwrite the
Ionesboro Food Bank for
any month it is unable
to pay its lease during
its first year of service.
One year later, the Food
Bank is given \$2,000
to purchase a freezer
and later admitted as a
member agency of
United Way.

1984: The Pillars Club is organized with 25 charter members at a donation of \$500 or more.

1984: United Way receives the first FEMA funds in the amount of \$23,000 to be used in the area of emergency food and energy assistance.

1955: The United Fund is organized, with a goal of \$37,000, to establish a primary fundraising source in the community to collect and disburse gifts to partner nonprofit agencies. The original member agencies are the Salvation Army, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, YMCA, Red Cross, and Junior Auxiliary. Its first campaign goal was exceeded, raising \$38,276.

THE POWER OF YOUR DOLLARS

The work of United Way is vast. In 2024, our team developed Community Connect as a way to highlight the work being done through our network that is "beyond funding". Community Connect is simple--it connects immediate needs with immediate solutions. Community Connect is made possible by community connections, direct designations, grants, and business partners. United Way funds are also allocated to the following organizations: American Cancer Society, American Red Cross, Arkansas Children's Hospital Foundation, Bridge of Hope Ministries, Children's Homes Inc. (Paragould), Jonesboro Human Development Center, LeBonheur Children's Hospital, and Make-A-Wish Craighead County. etc.

Options on Main

Our team partnered with Target and community donors to provide a cash donation and diapers to aid in the centers' efforts to meet the needs of local individuals facing unexpected pregnancies.

CityYouth Ministries

First Security Bank joined us to provide lunch and operational supplies at the end of the summer program for kindergarten through sixth grade students living in the Jonesboro community.

Helping Neighbors Food Pantry

When the pantry was facing the challenge of providing much needed supplemental food bags, our team partnered with Nestle to provide 200 bags of Starbucks coffee to help serve seniors receiving monthly supplemental food.

JPS SUCCESS Achievement Academy

With the help of an Aldi grant and United Way funding, our team was able to provide supplemental take home food, as well as hygiene items, to stock the pantry for students attending SUCCESS school.

Northeast Arkansas Humane Society

With direct donations, we were able to make a donation to the NEA Humane Society to assist their efforts to take care of surrendered or abandoned animals. We also provided a donation of pet food for their supply closet.

Red Wolves for St. Jude

In support of Red Wolves for St. Jude, United Way made a donation benefiting St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, whose mission is to advance cures and means of prevention for pediatric diseases and assist in critical care free of charge for children.

Salvation Army

During the holiday season, our team was able to provide hats and gloves, along with a meal, to help meet the needs of community members at the Salvation Army.



THE POWER OF YOUR SERVICE

United Way volunteers continue to serve as the heartbeat of our organization. While many of United Way's volunteer opportunities are event-based, our volunteer work stretches well beyond the events and groups listed here, including our planning committees for events like Batting for a Better Tomorrow and Day of Caring. In addition, volunteers help us reach our goals through their service on our Board of Directors, Campaign Team, and Regional Impact Committee.





Volunteer United

Volunteer United allows community members to stay connected and up-to-date with the mission and work of United Way. When we work together, we have the opportunity to change the future of our community, but it requires collaborative efforts. Joining Volunteer United allows volunteers to have an inside look into our work through volunteering their time at our annual events and as needed throughout the year, helping us make the greatest impact possible.

A-State United Way

Located on Arkansas State University's campus, this student-led group provides the campus community with a place to serve, learn, and make a statement by promoting and coordinating volunteer opportunities, while building relationships within the community. Funding raised by this group is allocated directly back to the A-State Food Pantry, which supports students, staff, and faculty.



Stuff the Bus

Our 2024 Stuff the Bus event brought in over 43,000 school supplies and \$11,641 in cash donations to support students across Northeast Arkansas. The event benefited 20 local school districts and covered seven counties.

Day of Caring

Last year's Day of Caring event celebrated 30 years of service in our community. More than 550 volunteers came together to complete 82 service projects, saving our community \$48,765 in construction and labor costs. Nearly 50 companies were represented and 45 local organizations, nonprofits, and individuals benefited from the event.
